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This is a unique edition in every way, permeated with warm wit and enthusiasm. Containing no fewer than 21 pages of enthusiastic footnotes, six pages of preface and an abundance of editorial suggestions, insights, scholarly research and musical wisdom, it is clearly a labour of love.

The editor Arthur Houle is primarily a performer-teacher of great experience – and tremendous humour. I have no previous experience of editions that begin with tongue-in-cheek questionnaires, but such is the case here: ‘At the risk of contravening critical edition protocol, please indulge this brief “True or false” quiz.’ Houle continues by way of explanation – not that this is really needed – to describe the edition as one ‘which uniquely blends rigorous scholarship with imagination and a soupçon of humour. For all the banter, this is the most scholarly edition of these famous sonatinas that I have encountered (and there is no shortage of alternatives).

Using the sixth rather than the fifth edition (as Maurice Hinson famously did in 1978) has led to some astonishing changes in works that I thought I knew well. Most striking are the many changes of registration, turning passages containing routine repetitions into something more striking. We also have new ornamentation, ‘music box’ pedalling and real clarity regarding tempi and misconceptions accumulated over generations.

The publication is steeped in information: practically every note is fingered, and there is a formal analysis of each section. Most amusing of all is bar 22 of the first movement in Sonata No 3 where at two points we are offered four possibilities for fingering!

All a bit manic and obsessive? Of course! Musicology and editorial footnotes in particular have tended to err on the dry side, so this all comes across as tremendously refreshing. If teachers are looking for a way to excite pupils about authenticity then they could do no better than turn to Arthur Houle’s Clementi project as a source of inspiration. I find myself more fired up over this music than ever before, even though it has been in my library for over four decades.
